Sacred Sites Tour

In our efforts to create understanding, learning and dialogue between Native and non-Native peoples, a small group from Trinity gathered on May 7 to immerse ourselves in Minnesota history from a Native perspective. Our tour explored Indigenous history, culture and sacred sites through storytelling and by being present to one another through silence/meditation/reflection and sharing.

Our facilitator was the Rev. Jim Bear Jacobs, member of the Stockbridge-Munsee Mohican Nation of central Wisconsin. Jacobs is a cultural facilitator who works to raise the public's awareness of American Indian causes and injustices, founder of Healing Minnesota Stories, and Co-Director of Racial Justice for Minnesota Council of Churches.

It was transformational to be at Bdote (where two waters come together)—the sacred place of creation for the Dakota people, then the concentration camp at Fort Snelling where more than 1,600 Dakota people—mostly elders, women and children—were imprisoned in 1862, and finally Oheyawahi/Pilot Knob—a hill that for centuries has been a gathering place for Indigenous ceremonies and burials.

The Sacred Sites Tour was organized by Trinity's Racial Justice Ministry Team. We hope to provide additional future opportunities to attend.

Land Acknowledgement

You may have noticed the short land acknowledgement now found in our worship bulletin: We are on Dakota and Anishinaabe (Ojibwe) land. We give thanks for their presence here since time immemorial and honor all our Indigenous siblings who have and continue to call this land their home.

Or perhaps the longer version found on our web site: Trinity Lutheran Church is located on the original and ancestral homelands of the Öčhéthi Šakówin Dakhóta people, specifically the Wahpekute Nation. We are on Dakota and Anishinaabe (Ojibwe) land. This land holds spiritual and ongoing importance for its original stewards, the Native nations and all Indigenous peoples of the St. Croix Valley region. We give thanks for their presence here since time immemorial. We also wish to recognize and honor all our Indigenous siblings who have and continue to call this land their home.

Trinity has begun the practice of land acknowledgement as an important point of awareness to telling the full history of the land which we occupy. This is especially poignant as we have just celebrated 150 years as a congregation and we begin our next 150 years with a journey toward truth and healing.

This practice is also a commitment made by our larger church, the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA). In the document "A Declaration of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America to American Indian and Alaska Native People" the church confesses its sins toward Indigenous peoples and identifies action items for moving forward.

One commitment is to formally acknowledge the original inhabitants of North America. The declaration states, "We commit to begin the practice of land acknowledgments at all expressions of the church."

The resources provided by Vance Blackfox, Director for Indigenous Ministries and Tribal Relations with the ELCA, were instrumental in crafting Trinity's land acknowledgement. Read more

Stewardship & Leadership

Some of you may already know that Trinity's Stewardship Team is undergoing transitions—in leadership and membership—but not in our purpose and passion for stewardship! After five years as team lead, I have stepped down and Noah Schumacher has assumed this role. Core ministries benefit from fresh ideas and energy, and Noah brings all of that and more. Thank you, Noah!

Team members have also changed. Long time contributors, Tim Gillis, Tami Jensrud, Amy Karlstad and Zach Lee have moved on to other priorities and opportunities to serve (Thank you all for your service to this team!). Melissa Haase and I are remaining on the team; and Mark Nelson and Ted Olson have joined the team. Pastor Chris and Bob Eiselt continue as our staff liaisons and coaches.

Given these changes, including in leadership, this article focuses on the type of leadership that I believe is best aligned with stewardship ministry.

What do you imagine when you think of leadership? A politician declaring victory on election night? A sports coach celebrating a winning season? A chief executive officer proudly announcing quarterly profits and stock dividends?

Jesus speaks of a very different kind of leadership several times in the gospels, usually ending with a surprising summary—"...if anyone wants to be first, they must be the very last and the servant of all." (Mark 9:34). To Jesus, excellence in leadership was not measured by the number of people serving a leader but the extent to which a leader was serving their followers. So, for those of us who follow Jesus, servant leadership seems the right form to adopt.

The publication of "The Servant as Leader," by Robert K. Greenleaf in 1970, started the modern *servant leadership* movement which quickly made its way into classrooms and boardrooms around the world. He

wrote, "The leader-first and the servant-first are two extreme types [of leadership]. Between them, there are shadings and blends that are part of the infinite variety of human nature ... The difference manifests itself in the care taken by the servant-first to make sure that other people's highest priority needs are being served. The best test, and difficult to administer, is: Do those served grow as persons? Do they, while being served, become healthier, wiser, freer, more autonomous, more likely themselves to become servants?"

Unlike other leadership models, Christian servant-leadership is rooted in God's love and guided by the Holy Spirit. While many people view leadership as a privilege, a position, or the result of hard work, Christians understand leadership as first and foremost a stewardship—something that God has gifted the leader with and entrusted to the leader. There are other important differences between servant-leadership and more traditional "command and control" models. I highlight three below.

God's Goals Versus Our Goals. All Christian leaders and stewards seek to discern and achieve God's goals rather than our own. Each Sunday we leave worship renewed in our commitment to be God's hands and feet, eyes and ears, working together to bring God's kingdom, God's dream, God's goals to our world. To that end, servant-leaders seek to tap into the full, embodied knowing of team members, through prayer, working together to accomplish God's goals for their ministry.

Other-Focus Versus Self-Focus. Christian servant-leaders put their followers (team members) first—before themselves and their agenda. They demonstrate an ability to care beyond their own personal advantage in order to foster the growth (including spiritual growth) and welfare of the team. Servant-leaders value each team member. They recognize their contributions, and regularly say "thanks."

They see God's beloved in each one and seek to engage their God-given gifts to support the team's ministry.

Persuasion Versus Command.

Christian servant-leaders are active listeners—listening to what is being said and noticing what's not. Thus, they seek to identify and clarify the will of the team to determine the best way forward. Servant-leaders also seek to build consensus among team members rather than to direct the course. Even when team members don't share the same view initially, servant-leaders can forge consensus by starting with acceptance and empathy. From this lens they consider each team member's perspective, ask questions, bring up ideas/facts not yet considered, and engage in dialogue.

Self-Awareness and Humility. Many of us view serving or being served as an indicator of our status in life. You know that you have arrived when somebody else cleans up your mess. Dirty dishes. Dirty clothes. Dirty feet. But when Jesus washed feet, he did so with the confidence of knowing exactly who he was. He came from God and he was on his way back to God-source of life, source of love. Like Jesus, confidence in our God-rooted identity allows servant-leaders to serve others in humility. Servant-leaders understand that leading doesn't make them better than others; it just makes them more responsible.

Christian servant-leaders are servants first and leaders second. They are responding to God's call by using God's gift of leadership to serve God's purposes. In God's kingdom, servant-leaders serve us best by leading us and lead best by serving us.

Financial Highlights April 2022

Contribution Income for the fiscal year through April YTD is \$120K behind last fiscal year. We made positive progress on catching up in the month of April. Total Income YTD is \$4K less than last year at this time. As discussed, we continue to see the timing and form of receipt of Contribution gifts fluctuating greatly v. past years, making it difficult to project expected fiscal year results. Program Registrations, Fees & Payments and Building Rental Income are up a combined \$24K YTD vs. last year, showing an increased level of activity in our building and programming this year. Restricted Income is up \$46K over last year, reflecting use of designated funds for the Worship Technology Upgrade. Overall, YTD Operating Expenses are \$79K higher than YTD April 2021. As we compare the difference in deficit this YTD v. last year, the increase in Staff wages (includes 2% increase) and benefits of \$43K v. last YTD is impactful but, necessary. For the month of April, the overall deficit increased by just \$2K. YTD our Contribution Income continues to lag behind last year and budget. Thus, we continue to carry a balance in our Line of Credit of \$90K, up \$90K over last year, at this time.



The Trinity Scholarship Fund was established through the generosity and foresight of Jeanette Johnson, a dear, departed, long-time member of Trinity Lutheran Church. It was her desire to provide the means by which Trinity could offer assistance to its young people whose achievement and character have indicated that they possess the qualities necessary to achieve excellence in higher education. The scholarships are awarded on the basis of academic status, cocurricular achievement, good citizenship and active involvement at Trinity.

Special thank you to Jeanette's nephew, Bruce Rydeen for his efforts to make Jeanette's wishes continue to be a reality.

The **gift of children** in Worship

The Goldfish have run out. The crayons have lost their luster. The fidget that was holding my toddler's attention was dropped and has now rolled several pews ahead of where our family is sitting. We're getting closer and closer to the Prayers of the Church. It's at this point in the worship service that my mouth goes dry, I no longer hear anything in the Worship Center but my wiggly toddler and fussy baby, and my entire being goes into panic mode. I say a little prayer of my own: "Lord, please just let us get through the prayers without a total meltdown. Please, please,"

And then it happens. The toddler goes careening over the pew in front of us, screaming at me as I try to grab her: "No, Mommy, no! Go away!" The baby has decided he's hungry and won't wait another minute to let me know. I share "the look" with my husband and think to myself, why did we think this was a good idea?

As I've been there, I know so many of you have been there, too. Perhaps it was last Sunday, or maybe it's been several years. No matter how long it's been, the pangs of worshipping with small children are feelings not quickly forgotten.

Taking young ones to church is hard. Parents genuinely want to plant the seeds of faith in their children, nurture baptismal promises, while simultaneously not wanting to get screamed at by fellow worshippers. Okay, people probably won't *actually* scream at you, but even the thought that others are annoyed by your presence can be enough to make you feel cringy and want to run.

As a growing parent myself, it often feels like I don't know much. But as your Children & Family Faith Formation Coordinator, here's what I do know (and what I need to hear myself as a parent): Worshipping regularly—at least once a month or more—matters. Showing up, sitting in the pew or gathering around a device at home, going through the motions to the best of your abilities even if we don't catch most of the sermon, matters. Faith is caught, not taught; and just like all things throughout life, our little ones learn best by experiencing. Our children need to see us loving Jesus, interacting with Jesus, and outwardly showing the world that the Gospel has changed our hearts by the decisions and actions we take in our everyday lives.

Trinity does not want church to be a place where kids need to overly behave, are ultra-controlled, or shushed. Talk about a quick way to get your child to dislike church! Trinity wants church to be a place of JOY and grace for your family, for you, and your children.

Movement is normal. Outbursts are normal. Screams are normal. Tears are normal. Audible questions in the middle of the somber moments are normal. For parents, this all translates to feeling cringy and wanting to run but know that your church is behind you.

Here is how Trinity is taking steps to support families and make worshipping together as a family more accessible:

- **Grace Spaces.** Special and inclusive spaces strategically set up around the Worship Center and Narthex for children (and anyone else!) to play, color, and be included in worship comfortably.
- Worship Bags. Developmentally friendly bags for children of all ages that include books, activities, crafts, and fidgets to keep little hands busy.


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- Children's Bulletins. During the program year (September—May), no matter how you worship, Children's Bulletins are prepared each week to use on site at Trinity or remotely. Curated from Spark House Digital resources, Children's Bulletins provide ways to process worship together as a family, summarize the day's message, and provide engaging activities for children.
- **Step Out.** During the program year (September—May), children are invited to briefly "step out" of worship during the sermon to hear the same message as in the Worship Center, but in a way that resonates with children. Think: Interactive children's message.
- Children's Messages. During the summer Drive-in months (May—September), children are invited to come forward during Drive-in worship to hear a short message that helps bring the Bible story for the day to life. Lots of helpers are needed to make this happen! Consider sharing your gifts with children by signing up to lead a children's message this summer with the provided QR code.



• Nursery and a Nursing Room. Trinity has a unique set of challenges when it comes to providing a space for relief and a break that do not feel isolating to those who need the option of a nursery or nursing room. We are entertaining lots of creative solutions for a future nursery and nursing room and hope to have a plan in place by this fall! Stay tuned!

Parents, if no one has told you recently, let me do the honors of informing you that *you are doing an amazing job*! Your faith community loves you and loves the gift and presence of your child(ren) in worship. If you'd like more resources about worshipping as a family, let's talk—I've got lots more to share. 
Milestone Celebrations at Drive-in Worship Sundays, June 12 & Aug. 7

UPDATE: Tanzania

Trinity Lutheran Church has been in relationship with our sisters and brothers in the village of Mwatasi, Tanzania for almost 20 years. Many of you have had a chance to travel to the Iringa Region of Tanzania. For those that haven't, I would like to give you a quick overview of our relationship and for all of you I would like to give you an update on what is happening.

The two primary elements of our Tanzania missions in the Iringa area include: our Companion Congregation Relationship with the Mwatasi Lutheran Church in the rural high country of the Iringa district and providing Secondary School Scholarships for students from Mwatasi. We also maintain involvement with partner organizations in specific projects related to our core missions, such as Iringa Hope (savings and loan, agriculture support), strategic support to the Bomalang'ombe Secondary School, and water projects in Mwatasi through St. Paul Partners.

Mwatasi Lutheran Church is the main church in the village and there are ten other preaching points around the area. It is part of the Evangelical Lutheran Church of Tanzania and the Iringa Diocese. Pastor Erasto Chaula leads the congregation of almost 1,500 members and there are a handful of evangelists that help to cover the needs of the congregation and preaching points.

Pastor Chaula and two other leaders from the church shared thanksgivings and challenges with our Tanzania task force last week.

Thanksgivings:

- 1. Thank you for secondary school scholarships! This year we have 11 boys and 15 girls in scholarship.
- 2. Renovating the pastor's house.
- Support for our new Market Center, of which we have many members. This has been a blessing to our economy.
- 4. Clean and safe water has been a blessing.
- 5. Ibrahim's bicycle. (Ibrahim is one of the special needs adult members who received a hand pedal bicycle in 2021 as a result of Trinity's 2018 village travel.)

Challenges:

- 1. Recent forest fire due to dry conditions burned 40 acres of the church's pine trees.
- Pump for the village water system was stolen, creating safe water distribution issues.
- 3. COVID-19 caused health and economic hardships.
- 4. Pastor Chaula needs to hire or borrow a motorbike to travel to preaching points. The previous bike of 15 years has reached the end of its usefulness in such difficult terrain.
- 5. A lack of benches in new preaching points.

Our Trinity Mission Committee recently approved to move forward with repairing the water system and replacing the stolen pump. We expect this to be completed in the next couple months. St. Paul Partners will manage the project.

We have much to learn from our friends in Mwatasi, specifically around evangelism and joy. I am grateful for the opportunity that we have as a congregation to continue our relationship with our sisters and brothers in Mwatasi. Stay tuned for more to come.


