

What if we just as boldly practiced Love Speech!

Going public!

Friends in Christ,

This article will start with some hard things but move us into hope!

Last week a member shared that she was approached by a Stillwater citizen who was appalled that Trinity is building affordable housing on our property (we are not) and said "We don't want that riff-raff here." The other woman went on to list the racial and ethnic groups that, in her mind, are not welcome or wanted in Stillwater. It was a tough experience for our sister in Christ and she was brave and respectful in the face of hard, hateful language.

What became clear as we reflected together on that conversation is that it matters that we take our faith public and live our Gospel witness out loud. A lot of voices are clamoring for airtime and some of them are hurtful, even hateful. And what is more, they are not quiet, shy, or polite about it.

For example, a protester on our corner recently gave me a dressing down about the sinfulness of female clergy, in front of my middle child.

We got an email from a neighbor in response to the Why Treaties Matter Exhibit and our series with Vance Blackfox, saying unrepeatable things about Indigenous people and other groups in our community.

Everyone was within their rights to say what they said, until it became hate speech.

What if we just as boldly practiced Love Speech! Remembering that the Apostle Paul teaches that love is an action, rather than just a sentiment, we might ask: what does love speech look like?

In the body of Christ, love speech looks like listening for understanding and removing ourselves from a situation when we can no longer be respectful or effective. It looks like asking people what they are concerned about, what they fear most.

It looks like yard signs, postcards, get out the vote activities, and voting for candidates that affirm our shared values, like hospitality, abundance, inclusivity and justice.

It looks like volunteering—as so many of you do!—in the community, showing up for all kids, and promoting policies and projects that uphold our neighbor and make our community the kind of place where all are welcome. (Please see the article on the next page about the exciting new emergency housing project through Washington County!)

Most of us—not all—come from reticent Northern European stock and are hesitant to speak up. But while our silence might feel polite, it also means other voices hold the floor, pepper social media, and dominate the air waves. The world needs the witness of Jesus-ians to know their belovedness and inherent worth in the eyes of God. The world needs Love Speech to remind us that we are one on this earth and that we need each other to create communities where all lives can thrive.

And, as one colleague said, aren't we, after all, God's riff-raff? Sinner and saint. Holy and beloved, warts and all! And all are truly welcome here! Say it loud and say it with love!

Emergency Housing: Love of Neighbor in Bricks and Mortar!

Some of you are already aware that Washington County has approved \$8 million to build or purchase a space for emergency housing in the county. The county has located a site in the city of Stillwater that they want to purchase and repurpose for this inspiring work. Right now, Washington County is already housing about 20 individuals or pairs (singles, couples, parent/adult child) in two hotels, one in Stillwater and one in Woodbury.

Further budget allocations provide the means to contract with Stepping Stones Emergency Housing to operate the housing. Supportive services will be located within the building, allowing the residents to move toward more permanent housing solutions. This work is already being done, but it's expensive to pay market rates for hotel rooms. Building emergency housing would offer the same supports more efficiently and economically to the neighbors that already live in Washington County.

That's an important detail. The people who would be housed in this new facility are already our neighbors. Many of them have jobs in the community, like checking us out at the grocery story.

While many struggle with disabling conditions, they are better able to achieve sustainable health and permanency with stable housing.

Sadly, there are rumors that the folks currently housed at the local hotel are

causing trouble, when in fact, they are not. They are vulnerable, often victimized by others staying at the hotel. Like we all do, they deserve safe housing.

We are partnering with our local congregations in support of this project. So, over the next months we will update you about opportunities to support this holy, sacred work. (Yes, it's county work, but it is love of neighbor in bricks and mortar!)

What can you do?

Pray for this project, the leaders, decision makers, and the human beings at the center.

Get educated. There are info sheets on the Welcome Counter outside the church office. Ask John Hodler, Jeff Anderson, Roger Funk, Pastor Peter, or Pastor Chris your questions. We would all love to chat with you.

Contact your council person, offering your support for the project with your voice, prayers and enthusiasm.

This is the kind of community we want to live in. The kind that doesn't export it's vulnerable—rather embraces, cares for, and supports them. Offering each neighbor the dignity and safety they deserve.

Please contemplate the information below and may you find it helpful in your caring conversations.

Key messages:

- All people in Washington County want a safe and dignified place to live.
- The pandemic exposed the need for emergency housing in Washington County. The county has the capacity and the existing framework in place to respond to the needs of people experiencing homelessness.
- Washington County kept people safe during the pandemic with emergency housing in hotels. It was a wise use of public resources. The county can build on the success of the hotel program by creating space for short-term emergency housing.
- Washington County's emergency housing will create a safe, dignified, supportive place for people who live here to navigate homelessness and move toward the stability of home.
- No one can prosper without a home base. Supportive emergency housing gives people the chance to go to work, keep their health and stay in relationship with family and loved ones.

Myth: Providing emergency housing to homeless people will attract more homeless persons from other counties.

Fact: Washington County "exports" more homeless persons to other communities. In 2019-2020, an average of 58 Washington County residents utilized shelters in Ramsey, Anoka, and Dakota counties. We currently have 20 spaces in hotel shelter, and we have been at capacity the whole time. This allows very limited capacity to serve persons from other counties.

Comprehensive Campaign

New and Renewing - the Next 150 Years

Over the summer we conducted a feasibility study for a comprehensive campaign for Trinity to address three areas: mission, capital improvements, and debt reduction. With your input and the guidance of our consultant, Steve Olson of Olson Advancement, the council voted to move ahead with a vote for this campaign at the annual meeting on Nov. 20. Our constitution requires a congregational vote (with a two-thirds majority in favor) to proceed with a capital campaign.

We have already begun creating a leadership team to shepherd this process should it pass: Chris and Marilyn Johnson, Mike Karlsrud, and Deb and Matt Simcik have already agreed to serve on the campaign cabinet.







Anthony Bateza Is an Associate Professor of Religion; Department Chair of Race, Ethnic, Gender and Sexuality Studies; Director of Race and Ethnic Studies. He is a specialist in Martin Luther, moral theology and Christian ethics. Luther's political theology is his primary area of research, focusing on the reformer's understanding of human agency and his relationship with the virtue tradition and Augustinian thought. He is also personally and professionally invested in questions of race, identity, and



social justice. He has written on Black liberation theology and connections between Lutheran teaching and confronting racism in the United States.

Sunday Forum Sparks Important Discussion of Current Issues

The first amendment to our U.S. Constitution prevents the government from making laws that regulate an establishment of religion, or that prohibit the free exercise of religion, or abridge the freedom of speech, the freedom of the press, the freedom of assembly, or the right to petition the government for redress of grievances.

On Sunday, Oct. 16, Dr. Bob Boyd led a Sunday Forum which explored how and why the religious beliefs and practices of America's earliest colonists, early American leaders (Washington, Adams, Madison, Franklin and Hamilton), the Great Awakening (1730s and 1740s), The Enlightenment (1680-1790), and even the French Indian War (1754-1763) shaped the religion and politics that led to this important amendment.

The Forum under the leadership of Pastor Peter and Penny Catlin seeks to educate us regarding the foundations of our beliefs, faith, and Lutheran background.


The Cimarron Kidspace Library formally opened as part of the Cimarron Youth Center's summer celebration. Families were welcomed to explore the library and check out books. This library was subsidized by Trinity's Outreach Missions Team, Trinity Tuesday Morning Book Club, Thrivent, Elks Lodge, and individual donations.

"Here's the Scoop" is the next celebration for school-aged children in the after school care program at Cimarron. Site Coordinator Andy Calixto extended time at the center for children who joined the new Kidspace book club. English/Spanish parental permission forms were provided and children color an ice cream cone each day they read for 20 minutes. Andy states they "use the library once a day;" "it is spectacular in my eyes" to have kids lengthen their stay to read. Volunteers provide ice cream and the activity for the event.

Andy partners with Teen Site Coordinator Ahn Doan who has middle schoolers who both read to and listen to children read. Together they are planning a November Fall Festival Family potluck. Library volunteers will participate as well. A retired Lake Elmo teacher volunteers two hours a week with the children. If you are interested in becoming a volunteer, a background check is necessary. In Memory of Don Amus Fultz

The Rev. Don Fultz, age 84, passed away on Oct. 2, 2022.

Many in the Trinity community think of Don in partnership with Eunice, his wife of 59 years. Or perhaps your connection may be as the father to Todd Fultz or Tami Salo, or the loyal grandparent to five grandchildren. Maybe you met him as the pastor and grieving parent of son Tim who passed away, and then wrote a book and helped others to find their way through grief and loss. Perhaps you know him as your visitation pastor, a role he fulfilled well in the past few years for Trinity during his retirement.

Some of us were blessed to meet Don (and Eunice) as the first volunteer coordinators of Bega Kwa Bega (BKB)—the relationship between the Saint Paul Area Synod and the Iringa Diocese in Tanzania. The day after "retiring" from full-time parish ministry in Forest Lake in 2000, Don and Eunice began their 13-year ministry in a new role as volunteer coordinators of BKB, often spending half the year in the U.S. and half in Tanzania. Don was known for welcoming people to "Come and See" what is happening here in Tanzania; "Come and See" what God can do when we all walk Bega Kwa Bega (shoulder to shoulder).

During the Celebration of Life for Don at Trinity, Pastor Nixon Mwitula of the Iringa Diocese brought greetings from Bishop Blastone Gavile and the Diocese. He enumerated some important contributions to the Iringa Diocese that would always be remembered of Don Fultz' mission and pastoral work:

 Don was among the founders of BKB and more than 66 congregations now benefit from this relationship;

- Don's ability to secure scholarships for orphans and needy Christian and Muslim students from Secondary to University level;
- 3. Connecting other institutions to support good earth care, through the safe water project and including

microfinance to alleviate poverty;

- 4. He learned both Swahili and HeHe to build relationships;
- 5. Personally supporting vulnerable students at Huruma Center [orphanage].

Pastor Mwitula closed his remarks by saying, "He lived the Gospel."

Pastor Phil Peterson who served with Rev. Fultz in several capacities over the years gave several examples that building relationships was what was important to Don. He told about meeting Don in 1977 as part of the interview process for a job that Don had orchestrated. It was 11 years before the formation of the ELCA, when there were two different Lutheran denominations. The pastoral job would be shared between the two churches. "Don had demonstrated the possibility of uniting in mission two congregations from two Lutheran denominations. The relationships were more important to Don than the differences between those two Lutheran bodies."

Thank you, God, for helping this relationship expert, these relationship partners, to say "Yes!" to your call to pioneer the relationship ministry between the Saint Paul Area Synod congregations and the Iringa Diocese in Tanzania! We have been richly graced with the fruits of their labor.



In gratitude for Don Fultz' contributions to establishing Bega Kwa Bega, our Tanzanian partner relationships, and our understanding of Accompaniment Mission, the Outreach Missions Team has contributed \$1,000 on behalf of Trinity for the support of Bega Kwa Bega—Saint Paul Area Synod in memory of Rev. Fultz.

I'm going to buy another to read to my teenage grandkids and to all who will be around the table this Thanksgiving. It is *Keepunumuk*: Weeâchumun's Thanksgiving Story. It's amazing and beautiful. Maybe we'll read it every year. Maybe next year our family will learn from Indigenous Peoples and choose a day that honors our ancestors (perhaps a birthday or marriage) and enjoy a turkey dinner and football games. Maybe next year, on the third Thursday in November, we'll honor Indigenous People and their Day of

Mourning by having everyone prepare a recipe from *The Sioux Chef's Indigenous Kitchen* cookbook, by Sean Sherman.

Christmas suggestions: We collected an offering at each Listen, Connect, Understand event, as Lutherans do, and the entire collection of \$900 was given to Minnesota Indian Women's Resource Center, a non-profit social and mental health services organization committed to traditional ways of being and support of Native women and their families (https://www.miwrc.org). Building on Keepunumuk: Weeâchumun's Thanksgiving Story, which will certainly open hearts and minds, there are many creative ways to open hands at Christmas by "returning the gift" (an Indigenous practice) in ways that build up our Indigenous family.

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
