A simple "Well, hello there, stranger." or "Long time, no see!" sounds like someone shouting an accusation across the room while a spotlight descends on YOU!

Yep. It does feel that way. No one can talk you out of that feeling. And perhaps, if you are among those who are hesitant to come back, you can hear another truth. You are missed. (You are. It's true.) And you are wanted.

Truth is, sometimes we go away for a while. We fall out of the habit. We need a break. We were hurt or put off by something and need to step away.

There really is no "not awkward" way through that first gauntlet back. For the simple reason that people miss you and are happy to see you! And they will express that happiness gracefully and gracelessly! Be assured that no one thinks less of you or mutters over your absence behind your back. (At least not in front of Pastor Peter or me!)

It is true, someone might say: "Are you new?" They themselves might be new or might simply have never met you. We can offer each other a lot of grace. We are a big church and it's impossible to know everyone. So, when we see a new face, maybe we can gently ask: "Have we met yet?" And we can receive the inquiry gently. We are all trying to make a human connection!

Over the last few months, I have met several of you back in the building for the first time in years. THAT IS THE BEST NEWS! We want you back! Not your money. Not your muscles. YOU. Our brother, sister, sibling in Christ.

And if you are thinking about coming back, it means you need us, too. We need each other. So, let's wade through the awkward, and bear up under the uncomfortable, well-meaning stuff. You are important. And you can step back in. Awkwardness and all. Because we are the body of Christ and belong to each other.

Myths & Facts about Emergency Housing provided by Washington County

Myth: People who are homeless are violent, dangerous, and/or criminals.

Fact: A person who is homeless is less likely to perpetrate a violent crime than a housed person, and is in fact more likely to be the victim of a violent crime, especially if they are a homeless woman, senior or child (Washington State Department of Commerce, 2016). The alternative is the indignity of people living in cars or on the streets, which none of us want.

Myth: Homeless people have done something to deserve it.

Fact: Experiencing homelessness or housing instability is not a character defect. It is often incurred because of the sudden loss of income, loss of a partner/roommate, health emergency, disability or a circumstance beyond one's control.

Trinity helped build one of the dwellings and everyone was alight with smiles and the soft glow of defiant candles. And some tears of joy.

It had been a long time in the making and lots of tireless work to see this new development find these fruitful footings, including building a beautiful Community Room inside Prince of Peace to support these new neighbors, where we shared refreshments and gratitude for God's presence in this place.

When we toured the home that Trinity helped build, where a young family of three is living, the daughter had made a series of small gratitude keepsakes to share with the supportive community. Little cards with hearts and flowers and some greenery and the word "Home." It was a huge gift of thanks for this cozy beloved home.

This is such great ministry, Trinity, and a movement with so many lessons wrapped up in tiny blessings. Tiny homes offer a different way to practice neighborliness that is community-led, community-built, and community-funded. They challenge old models of stacked housing developments and invite creativity in church buildings. It may not solve all the housing issues that people have, but it's starting small with a solid foundation and gaining faithful momentum across the county.

It can take time to see these kind of ministry seeds grow, especially when we seek to engage in big challenges locally. But this kind of small but mighty generosity continues to inspire.

Tiny Home Blessing For Settled Prince of Peace – Roseville Jan. 15, 2023


God of homecoming and new Beloved community, we thank you for your light and we ask you to bless these homes and all who dwell in them.

Financial Notes December 2022

Contribution Income for the fiscal year through December YTD is \$12K behind last fiscal year. Contribution Income for the month of December was \$185K, \$17K higher than December 2022. Total Income YTD is \$8K less than this time last year. As discussed, we continue to see the timing and form of receipt of Contribution gifts fluctuating greatly v. past years, making it difficult to project expected fiscal year results. A number of our members who pledge did not complete their pledge for CY 2022, representing a contribution income shortfall of over \$75K. Economic and stock market worries could very well be affecting this result. Program Registrations, Fees & Payments and Building Rental Income are up a combined \$14K YTD vs. last year, as we continue to experience increased levels of activity in our building and programming this year. Overall, YTD Operating Expenses are \$34K higher than YTD December 2022. Personnel Expense, \$18K higher, and Operations, \$19K higher, (TrinityFEST/ Social Justice/History Books/Insurance) account for much of that increase. YTD our Contribution Income continues to lag behind last year and budget. Thus, we are carrying a balance in our Line of Credit of \$90K, compared to a balance of \$75K last vear at this time.

Trinity's new Giving & Registration Kiosk is now up and running in the Commons! Early returns indicate that people are pleased with the addition. Construction of Trinity's dedicated mobile app is underway and will be available soon, to assist us in taking advantage of current technology for giving and registration as well.



about the theme

The lectionary for Year A offers us many stories of Jesus encountering people who are seeking: Nicodemus comes to him in the veil of night, he approaches a Samaritan woman at a well, he heals a man born without sight. In these stories, each person is seeking a new beginning, a different life, a deeper faith. What unfolds is an exchange filled with questions and exploration. Often, an unveiling occurs—assumptions are disrupted, a new perspective is revealed, mystery grows.

And so, we've crafted a Lenten series founded on questions. Many of our weekly questions feel restorative ("Can these bones live?"). Some feel like a charge or challenge ("Who will you listen to?"). Some questions are hopeful and curious ("How do we begin again?"). Our questions won't necessarily lead to answers, but they can help us find clarity and a new perspective. Ultimately, we pray they lead to a new beginning, a restoration, a wider grace.

Like the characters in our Lenten scriptures, we are also seeking many things: clarity, connection, wonder, justice, balance. We are seeking our calling, the sacred, and how to live as a disciple. Throughout the turbulence of the past few years, many of us are asking big guestions about our lives and our faith. If you are returning to church, you are probably returning with more questions and a critical lens. We hope this series will help us unpack some of those big questions in ways that are honest and faithful. Throughout this season, we hope you will continually ask yourself: what am I seeking? What is God seeking?

This Lent, we invite you to engage in the spiritual practice of seeking. We encourage you to stay curious, open, and nimble. We hope you will soften your assumptions and expand your perspectives. We pray that these questions will create a safe space to seeking:

honest questions for deeper faith

explore—to be drawn more deeply into the fullness of life, into the heart of God.

about the logo

An eye feels like a recognizable and even predictable image for the general theme of Seeking, however, there is nothing all that simple or straightforward about this Lenten theme. As I studied the texts, I found there was repetition in visual imagery that held the texts together. As I sketched, the logo became layered with imagery that formed more shapes and meaning, sometimes obscuring and revealing more as I went. It was a balance of maintaining the legibility and clarity that is necessary in a logo, while connecting to a theme that is about being unable to find understanding or even tangibility. I wanted the logo at first glance to be somewhat obvious, but at closer inspection, I wanted it to expand, confuse, and surprise. The viewing of the logo itself is a process of seeking meaning. (See the description of each element on the next page.)

logo imagery key what do you see?



eye- The eye holds all of the logo's imagery and summarizes the theme of seeking, while referencing various narratives from the scriptural texts: Adam & Eve's eyes are opened, Jesus rubs mud on the blind man's eyes, Jesus asks Mary, "Who are you looking for?" The circles that create the pupil and iris can also represent: an aerial view of the well, the water basin at the footwashing, or the stone and tombs of Lazarus and Jesus.



veil- This curved line and the shape it creates repeats throughout the Seeking branding. The veil references the confusion and revelations that occur in a journey of seeking.



mud / garden soil- The drop of mud represents the dirt and garden imagery that is found throughout the scriptural texts: the Garden of Eden, the mud that is rubbed in the blind man's eyes, the garden of Gethsemane. It also references when Jesus is mistaken as a gardener at the empty tomb.



water- The drop of water references the many times water is mentioned in the texts. Jesus tells Nicodemus he must be born of water and spirit. Moses strikes a rock to find water. At the well, Jesus asks a Samaritan woman for a drink and offers her living water. Jesus meets the blind man at the pool of Siloam. Jesus washes the disciples' feet. The water drop can also reference a tear; Jesus weeps at the mouth of his friend Lazarus' tomb, and Mary weeps at the mouth of Jesus' tomb.



vessel - The shape of the vessel can be seen as a cup or a jar poured out. The vessel represents: the jar the woman leaves behind at the well after meeting Jesus, the jar of sour wine offered to Jesus while on the cross, and the communion cup present at our remembrance of Christ's sacrifice.



star / night- The star references a couple of the narratives that take place under the veil of night. Nicodemus finds and questions Jesus at night, and Mary comes to the tomb while it is still dark. In reference to the logo's overall eye composition, the star represents the glistening of recognition in one's eye.



leaf- The leaf represents the foliage present throughout the texts, and further supports the repetition of garden imagery. Adam & Eve create fig leaf coverings in the shadow of the tree of knowledge of good and evil, and upon Jesus' humble entry into Jerusalem on Palm Sunday, the crowds wave palm branches.



Feb. 12 & 26 – The War in Ukraine... One Year Later with Chris Gehrz

As we approach the first anniversary of Russia's February 2022 invasion of Ukraine, historian Chris Gehrz will help us think through a war that continues with no end in sight. In this two-part class, we'll look at the recent — and distant — history between Russia and Ukraine, the religious dimensions of the conflict, and what it means for peace and justice around the world. Chris Gehrz (PhD, Yale) has taught history at Bethel University for twenty years, offering courses in modern European, military/diplomatic, religious, and sports history. He is the author or editor of several books, including a



spiritual biography of Charles A. Lindbergh (Eerdmans, 2021), and regularly writes a Substack newsletter, The Pietist Schoolman. Chris attends Roseville Lutheran Church with his wife and children, where he is currently learning a lot about faith, early adolescence, and the limits of his own patience and creativity as a 7th grade confirmation leader.






WAPO YOUTH CAMP (COMPLETED GRADES 4-8) AUG. 13-18, 2023 \$610



Trinity Scholarship Fund

The Trinity Scholarship Fund was established by the estate of Jeanette Johnson, a Trinity member who dreamed of being able to offer college tuition assistance to youth whose achievement and character indicated they possessed the qualities necessary to achieve excellence in higher education.

Trinity awards up to four scholarships each year on the basis of academic status, co-curricular achievement, good citizenship and active involvement at Trinity. The trust also stipulates that scholarship recipients must be baptized at and confirmed by Trinity, and active participants in Trinity youth programs.

Once selected, scholarship winners may renew their scholarships for up to three additional years, providing they maintain a cumulative grade point average of at least 2.75 or a "B-" or, in the absence of a similar grading system, remain in "fine academic standing" as indicated by official record. Scholarship recipients must reapply each year for renewal.
