Saint and WHAT?!

Is it just me or does Lent feel like the season for sinners. What? You don't like that term?

If you have been around Lutherans for any length of time, you have no doubt heard the phrase "sinner and saint" used to describe the people of God. Our Lutheran theology holds that we are simultaneously: saint by the grace of Jesus Christ and sinner by origin. Or "simul justus et peccator." The sinner part is an argument based on the Doctrine of Original Sin which finds its roots in Augustinian thought and about which I could write pages. But for now, let's go with it. And please, hang with me. We are going somewhere good!

Article Two of the Augsburg Confession (one of our guiding documents) says: Our churches also teach that since the fall of Adam all people begotten in the natural way are born with sin, that is, without the fear of God, without trust in God, and with concupiscence; and that this disease, or vice of origin, is truly sin, even now condemning and bringing eternal death upon those not born again through Baptism and the Holy Spirit.

Our churches also condemn the Pelagians and others who deny that original depravity is sin, and who, to obscure the glory of Christ's merit and benefits, argue that people can be justified before God by their own strength and reason.

At the end of each funeral, we say the words: Into your hands, O merciful Savior, we commend your servant [Name]. Acknowledge, we humbly beseech you, a sheep of your own fold, a lamb of your own flock, a sinner of your own redeeming. Receive her/him into the arms of your mercy, into the blessed rest of everlasting peace, and into the glorious company of saints in light. Amen.

The language of sin is not foreign to us. We open most Sunday worship services with a time of confession, confident that forgiveness will be forthcoming. And still, conversation about sin can be truly confusing and off-putting. Despite the efforts of some traditions, calling people sinners in order to impel them into relationship with Christ to avoid eternal condemnation isn't a compelling marketing strategy and severely short changes the incredible good new of what life in Christ can offer.

And we well might ask: What does it mean to be born "in sin?" How do we acknowledge the wrongs we do without falling into shame? Do the unbaptized go to hell? What about, gulp, me?

This is all much more than can be fully addressed in a monthly newsletter article but there is something here worthy of our time together. For today, we can say that biblically-based church teachings are sacred and shaping for us all. And yet, they never supersede scripture. We can also say that sin is real and we all struggle with it in its many forms.

And there is a larger truth at work in our lives.

Genesis 1 tells us that human beings are created *in God's image*. We were the last creatures breathed into being by God's speech—so far as Scripture records. And are made *in God's image*. (Worth repeating, don't you think?) After which "God saw everything that God had made, and indeed, it was very good." The Hebrew word for good is tov. Or



We are created in God's own image. Every single one of us. And God looked upon us and all of creation and called us tov. Not perfect. Not better than. Not without fault. Simply tov, good. Through God's own holy breath, God spoke into reality the essential goodness of each creature, each human.

God will never turn God's back on that which God created tov. We can never outsin God's love or capacity and willingness to forgive. We tell the children often and the adults not often enough. You cannot outsin the love of God. For you are God's image bearer and you are tov. You are good.

This year, during Lent, practice this. Sit quietly where you can be uninterrupted for a few moments. Place your hand on your chest or your belly. Breathe slowly for a few breaths. With your hand still on your chest or belly say out loud. "I am tov." Or "God calls me tov." Let that truth sink in deeply. Return to the practice when you are anxious, upset, hurt, struggling to sleep. "I am tov."

How does it change your breath, your body, your thought patterns? It is a temptation to move quickly into applying this to others. Which is good. And Jesus tells us to love others as we love ourselves. So practice a little self-love in the name of the God who made us tov, in God's own image. It is the foundation of neighbor love.

Remember always. You are tov.

On these longer and sometimes soulcrushing gray days of winter, I often find myself thinking about places that are warm and lush and green.

Since the summer of 2018, one of the places that comes to mind is the ELCA retreat center called Holden Village in the Cascade Mountains outside of Lake Chelan, Washington.

Fair warning: It's a little bit of a trek to get there in the first place. You have to fly in or ride the train and a bus to Chelan, then take a four-hour ferry ride followed by a thirty-minute bus excursion through the switchbacks toward this awe-inspiring vista of the camp. Sometimes there are lessons just in the journey. It's a wild place and definitely off-grid, which is also it's appeal.

But once you arrive, Holden boasts a powerful welcome and great food and incredible daily worship. There are a variety of classes, art workshops, hiking adventures to pristine mountain lakes, and a kids' day-camp called Narnia. There's even a bowling alley and a newly-renovated jacuzzi and lots of local fauna.

I am planning part of my sabbatical in June and early July 2023 to be at Holden, serving as a volunteer in the kitchen and getting a little behind-the-scenes experience of this renewal organization, while being refreshed in the Cascade rhythms.

Financial Notes January 2023

Contribution Income for the fiscal year through January YTD is \$45K behind last fiscal year. Contribution Income for the month of January was \$99K, \$33K less than January 2022. Total Income YTD is \$34K less than this time last year. As discussed, we continue to see the timing and form of receipt of Contribution gifts fluctuating greatly vs. past years, making it difficult to project expected fiscal year results. A number of our members who pledge did not complete their pledge for CY 2022, representing a contribution income shortfall of over \$75K. Economic and stock market worries could very well be affecting this result. Program Registrations, Fees & Payments and Building Rental Income are up a combined \$20K YTD vs. last year, as we continue to experience increased levels of activity in our building and programming this year. Overall, YTD Operating Expenses are \$48K higher than YTD January 2022. Personnel Expense, \$23K higher, and Operations, \$24K higher, (TrinityFEST/Social Justice/History Books, Snow Removal, Insurance) and Worship, \$8K higher, account for the majority of that increase. Some of these expenses are offset by increases in Restricted Income and/or Fees & Payments. YTD our Contribution Income continues to lag behind last year and budget. Thus, we are carrying a balance in our Line of Credit of \$75K, compared to a balance of \$55K last year at this time.

YOU are invited to join Mike Johnson and Michele Hermansen on an exhilarating trip to meet wonderful friends in our partner congregation of Mwatasi, Tanzania this year! Proposed trip dates are Oct. 8-22, 2023.

The trip will center around spending significant time living in the village with our partner congregation of Mwatasi, experiencing what the people of Tanzania can teach us. Walking alongside the pastor and various church members will allow us to see and learn about their strengths, challenges, goals, and breadth of their ministry. We will meet with members of Iringa Hope who belong to the SACCOS (savings and loan) and/or AMCOS agricultural cooperative to see and hear about the resulting changes in their lives.

While in Mwatasi, we will do some assessment of village water system status and meet with village leaders regarding plans and priorities for its sustainability, in conjunction with St. Paul Partners.

We also expect to visit two Secondary Schools to connect with students and see what education and scholarships mean to them, as well as their goals and challenges. Additionally, before going to the village we will be introduced to some of the other NGOs that serve villages in the area.

We will end the trip with one full day and two nights in Ruaha National Park where we will have the opportunity to see some of the animals that Tanzania and Africa are known for, on safari drives. This will give travelers the chance to begin processing what we have seen, as well as to experience the Africa many people see when they travel.

Cost of the trip per person is projected to be \$5,100. Each traveler will be responsible for their own trip cost.

So if you're feeling any sort of curiosity, intrigue, excitement, interest—don't ignore it, please!

Small Miracles at Winter PIT Stop Event

More than 110 community members participated in the Stillwater PIT Stop Resource event held on Thursday, Jan. 26 at First Presbyterian Church. The event was staffed by volunteers from Washington County, area faith communities (including Trinity), and service agencies. This "Warm Up with Free Resources!" event offered: hot breakfast and lunch, fresh produce and staple food, gas and food cards, opportunities to use showers, laundry facilities, haircuts, financial services, flu and COVID-19 vaccinations and test kits, personal care kits, winter clothing, and information about available services.

The PIT Stop event was planned in conjunction with the annual HUD-mandated Point-in-Time (PIT) Count of all persons who experience homelessness on a night in late January. This nationwide effort helps communities like Washington County understand the extent of homelessness, measure progress in addressing the problem, and ensure that future support and resources are directed where they are most needed.

Here's a real-time example of a small miracle that happened at this event:

A family had an imminent eviction notice. Washington County HOST staff, Washington County Emergency Assistance staff, and Valley Outreach staff were able to assist this family in applying for emergency funding. What would have taken days or weeks was resolved in a couple of hours.

9 am | Traditional festival worship with children and adult choirs, organ and instruments.



Trinity Scholarship Fund

The Trinity Scholarship Fund was established by the estate of Jeanette Johnson, a Trinity member who dreamed of being able to offer college tuition assistance to youth whose achievement and character indicated they possessed the qualities necessary to achieve excellence in higher education.

Trinity awards up to four scholarships each year on the basis of academic status, co-curricular achievement, good citizenship and active involvement at Trinity. The trust also stipulates that scholarship recipients must be baptized at and confirmed by Trinity, and active participants in Trinity youth programs.

Once selected, scholarship winners may renew their scholarships for up to three additional years, providing they maintain a cumulative grade point average of at least 2.75 or a "B-" or, in the absence of a similar grading system, remain in "fine academic standing" as indicated by official record. Scholarship recipients must reapply each year for renewal.
