Actually, I'm not "fine."

Actually, I'm not "fine."

"Don't be bluffed into silence by the threats of bullies. There's nothing they can do to your soul, your core being. Save your fear for God, who holds your entire life—body and soul—in God's hands." – Matthew 10:28 (MSG)

Those of you who attended or watched online worship on Sunday, May 14 heard my sermon about the man name "Beau" who came into the church office a couple of weeks ago. He told us we had to "take down our crosses, if we approve of gays and lesbians because clearly we don't believe in any part of the Bible." It was a difficult conversation. In my sermon, I mentioned our inclination to want to comfort those who have such conversations and said that I am fine. It's others who aren't fine: like those this man hates.

But in truth. I am not fine. In fact, none of us are fine, if hate is allowed its way in our community, if bullies get to use up all the oxygen in the room.

It would be one thing if this man had come to us truly concerned for the eternal salvation of those he considers at risk. If he had come out of love. We still would disagree on the theology but would be on the level ground of love. But he did not. He came with words of hate. He has approached others in Stillwater with the same message, using derisive and slanderous language.

So, no. I am not fine. My heart is broken. My son is worried. Our neighbors are wounded.

How do we find our courage?

Ted and I were driving through Stillwater when he realized that the pickup truck in front of us was displaying an AR–15 style rifle in the rear window. Within the driver's rights, sure. But there as a statement nonetheless.

How do we find our courage?

Our son insisted that I report Beau to the police. Just in case.

How do we find our courage?

Is it enough to trust that our whole life—body and soul—is held in God's hands? Does that take away the pain of a parent afraid to send their child to school, or a teacher afraid to go to work? Does it take away the worry of retaliation on social media or in person?

In my boldest moments, I think: Heck YES! What are we living FOR if not to speak up even if our voices tremble, speak out even if our words are uncertain, and work for a better life for everyone!

In my most frightened moments, I grow small and silent, hoping it all just goes away.

But we have gay and trans people in our families. We have immigrants tending to necessary services and retail in our community. We have students experiencing chronic homelessness in class with our own kids.

"God did not give us a spirit of timidity, but rather a spirit of power and of love and of self-discipline." (2 Timothy 1:7) God has empowered us to love our neighbors actively and intentionally. Not just with kind thoughts and fervent prayers. But in speech and action, defending them against ALL harm. We dare not grow small and silent.

We continue to advocate for the inclusion of all people in our civic and religious lives. We continue to press for emergency housing in Washington County and Sacred Settlements of Tiny Homes. We continue to safeguard the dignity of those who need the support of food shelves, rental assistance, and state sponsored healthcare. We continue the humbling work of racial reconciliation.

Of course, we take measures to be smart and safe. But smart and safe does not mean small and silent.

It does matter than our bodies and our spirits are held by God, as are the bodies and spirits of each of our neighbors. We live together IN GOD. It is in God that we live and move and have our being. It is in God that we find assurance and strength. It is in God that we find our neighbor. It is in God that we find our power and our voice. Because God first loved us. Empowering us to live as Jesus in the world.

Financial Notes April 2023

Contribution Income for the fiscal year through April YTD is \$9K ahead of last fiscal year. Contribution Income for the month of April was \$112K, \$14K more than April 2022. Total Income YTD is \$12K less than this time last year. As discussed, we continue to see the timing and form of receipt of Contribution gifts fluctuating greatly v. past years, making it difficult to project expected fiscal year results. A number of our members who pledge did not complete their pledge for CY 2022, representing a contribution income shortfall of over \$75K. Economic and stock market worries continue to be a factor affecting this result. Program Registrations, Fees & Payments and Building Rental Income are up a combined \$28K YTD vs. last year, as we continue to experience increased levels of activity in our building and programming this year. Overall, YTD Operating Expenses are \$65K higher than YTD April 2022 but, are exactly in line with the approved budget for FY2023. Personnel Expense, \$34K higher, and Operations, \$28K higher, (TrinityFEST/Social Justice/History Books, Snow Removal and preventive HVAC maintenance) and Worship, \$7K higher, account for the majority of that increase. Some of these expenses are offset by increases in Restricted Income and/or Fees & Payments. YTD our Contribution Income continues to lag behind last year and budget. Thus, we are carrying a balance in our Line of Credit of \$90K, which is the same balance of \$90K last year at this time.

- Countless children and families benefited from Trinity's newest worship space addition. Adjacent to the Worship Center, the Calm Lounge is a welcoming place to nurse, change a diaper, or take a deep breath, while allowing parents to stay connected with worship.

- Over 20 volunteers from the congregation gave of their time and talents to offer a variety of Wednesday evening experiences to our elementary-aged youth (woodworking, book club, creative writing, calligraphy, yoga, cross-stitching, and more)!
- I5 Guest Speakers on a range of relevant and interesting topics for Sunday Faith Forum with average attendance of 50
- 2,000 meals served for allages Dinner Church
- 28 new members joined in 2022
- Quilters made and distributed 72 quilts to Lutheran World Relief and Bundles of Love.
- Countless calls made and cards sent from our Caring Friends to senior members. We have 32 Caring Friends serving 283 seniors.
- 96 birthday roses were delivered to our seniors (at age 80, 85 and 90+)

Friends, our campaign projects are underway! By the time this hits your mailbox, the wood sheathing on the drive-in screen will be down and the concession stand demolished. We are acquiring bids for repairs on the exterior of the Heritage Chapel. And our voting members bore witness at synod assembly as the bishop handed Lutheran Social Service of Minnesota a check for \$1,000,000 to start work on the therapeutic preschool on St. Paul's East Side – 2.5% of our campaign receipts are part of that huge and impactful gift. Thanks be to God!

Trinity's Comprehensive Campaign has generated a strong response from the congregation. As of April 30, 181 pledges have been received, with a total pledged about \$100,000 shy of the \$2 million mid-tier goal. Trinity is blessed to have received this level of support!

Racial Justice Ministry Team UPDATE

"This is my commandment, that you love one another as I have loved you." – John 15:12

With these words, the Saint Paul Area Synod called us into action to be "stewards of justice and beacons of love in a world of hate." Trinity's Racial Justice Ministry Team (whose work began in 2020-2021) responded with a grant application that was accepted and which has been the primary focus of our efforts for this year.

You remember the first phase of our grant work—an educational series entitled: Listen • Understand • Connect. Vance Blackfox, of the Cherokee Nation, led our worship services on Sunday, Oct. 2, 2022. You can watch it again on our YouTube channel at: https://www.youtube.com/playlist?list=PLN3zsLTSVhGl7 CNCSzT8OjQPC6sD7TPEk. He then led two classes, Indian 101 and Indigenous Thought & Theology—both incredibly informative and moving. Finally, Vance led a Blanket Exercise. If you ever see one announced, sign up!

We thought we had invited Vance to come and teach us. He told us that he came to heal us.

At the same time, we hosted *Why Treaties Matter: Self-Government in the Dakota and Ojibwe Nations*, a nationally recognized, award-winning exhibit made in partnership with the Minnesota Indian Affairs Council and the Smithsonian's National Museum of the American Indian. Between the information on retractable banners and the videos that could be accessed with a smartphone, there was more information than one could ever get through, let alone absorb. Fortunately, there is a permanent exhibit at the Minnesota State Capital and an even easier way to dig into this wealth of learning. Visit www.treatiesmatter.og to access the online virtual exhibit including all 46 video clips.

For the second part of the grant, we planned to collect stories from Native Americans in the St. Croix Valley and uplift and amplify their voices in a permanent display for the community, but we didn't really know how we were going to do that. Fortunately, the treaty exhibit inspired us to create a similar exhibit of retractable banners that will be available to churches, schools and community groups of all kinds. We're not there yet, there is so much to learn, but the groundwork has been laid and videotaping stories will begin this month. We have many months of work ahead, but we will keep you posted. Reflections on worship with 29:11 International Exchange on April 30

This past fall when members of the Trinity choir received our schedule of upcoming rehearsals and Sunday services, I was particularly interested to see that we would be collaborating with 29:11 International Exchange, a group of musicians visiting from South Africa. Rooted in scripture, specifically the book of Jeremiah chapter 29, verse 11, their message is one of universal humanity and their mission is to facilitate hope and reconciliation through music, crosscultural relationships, and individual artist development.

Throughout my 62 plus years of singing in choirs, I've experienced many different styles of worship and how fundamental the use of music is in expressing our faith. Music of all types and genres enables us to access deep emotion in profound ways. So, I was excited about the opportunity of worship with 29:11 and suspected we might be in for a real treat. The group arrived at Trinity on April 19 for a pizza lunch with choir members and staff, followed by the Stillwater Junior and Senior High Concert Choirs joining them in the Trinity sanctuary to sing and share time together. To witness and be part of the exuberant energy of these assembled young people was an amazing experience. After rehearsing with 29:11 that evening we left energized and excited for the coming weekend.

In Nehemiah 8:10 we're told that "The joy of the Lord is your strength." I have experienced joy in many different ways throughout my life





and have come to realize that joy is more than just an expression of God's goodness. It is a deep-rooted, inspired happiness that is more than simply an emotional reaction to circumstances. I believe that the purest form of joy comes to us in ordinary moments that can happen any place where gratitude is alive and that joy is a determined choice to praise God in every situation.

Through the grace of God and the witness of this remarkable group of people I experienced a joy deeper and more profound than I could ever have imagined. Devotional:The Hard Work of Healing

by Kristie Anderson, Trinity Member "And all the trees of the field shall clap their hands!" – Isaiah 55:12

This favorite Bible verse carries me through all the tree seasons, thankful for the beauty of spring and fall, the abundance of summer, and the sturdy solitude of winter.

Through YogaDevotion recently, I added this second tree verse to my list: and the leaves of the trees are for the healing of the nations.

- Revelation 22:2b

This fits me well because I live in view of the St. Croix River and my neighbors across the way are Wisconsinites! The symbolism of the river being a possible dividing line, with Wisconsin being another nation, leads me to think of all the "trees" everywhere working to heal nations. Nations might be different ethnicities or races or states or family members or even political parties. I believe God desires and rejoices over any attempts of reconciliation and restored relationships. And the trees are clapping their hands when we do the hard work of healing.

Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton recently announced, "Knowing and embracing the truth is the first step toward healing for all of us."

We are in the pursuit of historic truth: to be uncovered, to be taught in schools, to be read in books.

Pursuing truth is hard work. To read of our nation's past, to be horrified by actions of many of our ancestors, to accept it as truth, to acknowledge the need to repent, and to change our behavior and our biases, is all hard, essential work.

In the ABIDE Readers book group (everyone is welcome, anytime!), we recently read *White Birch*, *Red Hawthorn* by Nora Murphy. In this memoir of her journey to uncover truths about her Minnesota and Irish roots, the author titled each chapter with a particular tree or growing plant important to that step in her story.

Revisiting truths such as the need for Indigenous Peoples' Day, a re-thinking about Thanksgiving, and debunking Paul Bunyan and Laura Ingalls Wilder myths. Uncovering truths such as the extreme violation of treaties by our ancestors, the stripping away of resources, the shrinking of sacred space where revered wild rice and sugar maples flourished.

It's hard reading. It's hard to absorb. It's hard to move forward. But think then, of our Indigenous neighbors right here right now who still carry these hardships in their bodies, in their psyche, in their daily lives.

And we can do the hard work of the healing of the nations.

With all of this heavy on my heart, I look for hope. These are healing changes worth celebrating:

- 1. Renovated Fort Snelling and the Minnesota History Center as agents of truth-telling.
- Our current Secretary of the Interior, Deb Haaland, a Native American of the Pueblo of Laguna.
- 3. Our state's Lt. Governor, Peggy Flanagan, a citizen of the White Earth Nation.
- 4. Sean Sherman known as "the Sioux Chef" is the highly acclaimed chef of Minneapolis restaurant, Owamni, whose mission is to use Indigenous foods as a way of healing from the damaging influence of colonialism.
- 5. Trinity's own land acknowledgment.
- 6. An Indigenous Brazilian woman, Alessandra Korap Munduruku, was awarded the Goldman Prize in April 2023 for her grassroots activism. She led the successful protest to protect her people's territory in the Amazon rainforest. She confronted a huge mining company, Anglo American, which then withdrew 27 research mining applications from Indigenous land!
- 7. The birds are singing, the trees and trails await. Nature welcomes us with its healing power!

All are avenues of hope, truth-telling, and the beginning of reconciliation, while at the same time, we also acknowledge there's so much more to be done.

But we still celebrate! We still clap our hands!

I'm ending with a passage from another ABIDE Readers book selection, *CASTE* by Isabel Wilkerson (page 349). It's a retelling of a time recently in Germany when a historian of Nazi Germany was talking with a group of young adult students from Germany.

He asked the students, "Do you feel guilty?"

After meeting separately to discuss this, the students responded, "Yes, we are Germans, and Germans perpetrated this...it is the older Germans who were here who should feel guilt. We were not here. We ourselves did not do this. But we do feel that, as the younger generation, we should acknowledge and accept the responsibility. And for the generations that come after us, we should be the guardians of the truth."

Back to truth-seeking.
Back to truth-telling.
Back to healing of the nations.
Back to leaves clapping their hands.
And back to a long-desired walk in the woods!
