The Waterfall of Justice art exhibit: a place for prayer and hope

Waterfalls represent the waters of our baptism: ever-flowing, never-ceasing streams of holy water. Waterfalls also represent justice flowing down into the places where justice is needed, a mighty river that refreshes and restores us to God's love for all people.

For several weeks in January and February, Trinity made available strips of fabric and markers for people of all ages to share their hopes, dreams, and prayers for justice in the world. These fabric strips are now combined into a Waterfall of Justice art exhibit and serve as a representation of this community's lament for a just world. The exhibit is a visual symbol of diversity, justice and hope for all of God's creation.

The Waterfall of Justice artwork is displayed in the Trinity Commons. This collaborative artwork is a place to pause, pray, experience a call to action, remember neighbors and siblings near and far, reflect on the words used in holy baptism, and feel God's love flowing for you and all God's beloved children.

Grave Clothes

But Peter jumped to his feet and ran to the tomb. He stooped to look in and saw a few grave clothes, that's all. He walked away puzzled, shaking his head. – Luke 24:12 (MSG)

Stooped to look in and saw a few grave clothes.

Grave clothes.

In Jesus' time, grave *clothes* were more like grave *cloths*. Fabric strips that bound the body, also called a shroud. Another cloth would cover the face. All of which would be specially woven or purchased for burial.

Grave clothes means something different now. When those we love die, and we have an open casket reviewal or do a full body burial, we carefully choose something for them to wear. A jersey from their favorite team, their best suit or dress. One of my uncles was buried in his "uniform" of a button-down shirt, crew neck sweater, and Dockers.

Then and now, these clothes or cloths would go with the deceased into the grave. Family or professionals tenderly wrapping the body in a last act of physical care.

After Jesus' crucifixion, death and burial—dawn comes after the long sabbath rest. The women go to the tomb and find Jesus missing. After they tell the disciples, Peter runs back and finds the grave clothes abandoned. Left behind. No longer of use.

It's easy to turn those grave clothes into a metaphor. What do we need to let die or leave behind in our own lives? How do we find resurrection, renewal, a fresh start in this life?

But if we jump too quickly to the metaphor, we lose the power of what happened outside of Jerusalem so many years ago. We lose the power of the incarnation and the true presence of God with us.

Jesus is born of a woman, grows through boyhood, learns in the synagogue, eats, grows tired, rests, physically touches and actually heals (not a metaphor in sight), he bleeds, he weakens, he dies. He is fully and utterly human even as he is God. The grave clothes matter because Jesus' humanity mattered—because our humanity matters. Moving too quickly to metaphorical grave clothes can rob us of the hope-giving power of the real thing.

That broken body was buried exactly like every other broken body of its time. Shrouded and buried. Then human death is defeated by the God of life! Those grave clothes are not the proper garment for the living, so they are cast aside. Jesus is alive. Death no longer has the final word. Life wins. Love wins.

The actual grave clothes matter because they are evidence that death is defeated by life and by love.

As you make your slow journey toward Easter, honor the humanity in you. Your body, your feelings, your capacity, even your mortality. Jesus came not to diminish or overshadow our humanity but to liberate us and to celebrate what God has done in creating us just as we are: life and love.

A little more time to let my blood pressure slow. Maybe another few weeks to let this structured season seep into my veins and ventricles.



Greetings Trinity! Who does not like to receive an encouraging word? It is a simple message Paul gives the Thessalonians. "Therefore encourage one another and build one another up, just as you are doing."

I wanted to share just some of the things that I have found to be encouraging recently here at Trinity. It demonstrates your robust commitment to Trinity! I hope you will find encouragement in them as well.

- Our mortgage has been reduced by \$591,553 in 2023.
- Our line of credit at our bank is at \$0 for the first time since January 2021.
- Our giving in the month of January was tremendous—as we received \$131,979 towards 2024 giving.
- Our Comprehensive Campaign has received \$889,581 to date.

I am full of gratitude for your commitment and generosity to your annual giving in support of the church—as well as the Comprehensive Campaign—that builds up this community of faith.

I urge you to remain invested in your church so that we can continue to encourage one another and build up our community to share God's love and grace. Thank you again for all you do to continue to make Trinity a healthy, vital, and viable community of faith!

Stewardship Note

Hello friends, in preparation for our March *Trinity Today* entry, I came across this article written by Pastor Rob Blezard, who has written many posts on his site called The Stewardship Guy. The article resonated with me, so I thought I would share with you.

Holistic stewardship for Lent

For centuries Lutherans have observed Lent with passionate devotion and prayerful attention to spiritual disciplines. These faith practices strengthen our souls and open our hearts to the resurrected Christ at Easter.

This year, try developing a sense of holistic stewardship for your life. Stewardship, of course, looks at how we use not just our financial abundance but all the blessings that God has given us—our health, our family and friends, our faith, our time, our intelligence, and so on.

Just as holistic medicine takes a "big picture" view of physical health as a dynamic interconnection of our body's systems, holistic stewardship helps us see and appreciate all our gifts in relationship to one another.

For instance, how does your stewardship of time interact with your stewardship of your relationships or health? How might more-thoughtful stewardship of your time improve your relationships or your health? How might better stewardship of time, relationships and health improve your financial abundance?

When you examine your stewardship of these and all your gifts in dynamic interconnection with one another, you can find more meaning and purpose as a disciple of Jesus.

To get there, for the days of Lent focus on just five major categories of the blessings God has given you easily remembered by the shorthand word FAITH.

Family and friends—nurturing relationships.

Abundance—finance and material possessions.

Intelligence—your mind and special talents.

Time—living fully 24/7.

Health—physical and emotional wellness.

Spend 15 minutes every day to prayerfully ponder and meditate on these FAITH blessings. A prayer journal or notebook may help you process and connect.

- Take stock of your blessings in each category, thanking God for them.
- Reflect on how they interrelate to give you joy and purpose and meaning.
- Ask God to help you use these gifts more wisely and fully for God's purposes.
- Imagine God blessing and enriching your life as you learn to steward these gifts in a way that they will support and enhance one another.

This Lent, let holistic stewardship help you envision your gifts and life more fully in God's reality, the reality called the Reign of God. It's the Reign that Jesus preached and proclaimed, and that he brought to fulfillment with the victory over death that we celebrate at Easter.

FINANCIAL NOTES - JANUARY, 2024

In place of comments about the prior month's financial update, I will share some of the items covered at Trinity's Finance Team Meeting held on February 13, 2024. Team members include Jeff Anderson (Treasurer & team chair), Phil Hanson, Jill Longnecker, Tom Olsen, John Olson, Noah Schumacher, Andrew Thelander and Clark Thurn plus staff members Pastor Chris Bellefeuille, Sarah Kinsman (Parish Administrator), Brenda Schumacher (Accounting Coordinator) and Eric Trosdahl (Financial Secretary.) Jocelyn Gohdes also attended as a guest/prospective member. We received a formal presentation of the prior year's financial audit from our CPA firm. Sarah presented some Stewardship data as well as a 4-month detail of Actual vs Budget financial results. Sarah also shared information regarding various options we will need to consider before a May, 2024 scheduled mortgage interest rate goes into effect. I provided a Comprehensive Campaign update (see below for additional details.)

Another important Trinity financial news item is that I will retire from the role of Treasurer effective at the next Church Council meeting on February 19, 2024. My intention was to serve a short term as Treasurer while Sarah Kinsman transitioned into her new position as Parish Administrator. I'm very pleased to announce that our new Treasurer will be Jill Longnecker, a current Finance Team member and church council member. She is also a long-time Trinity member and recognized

congregational leader. I will remain on the Finance Team and as the Comprehensive Campaign Resource Coordinator.

<u>COMPREHENSIVE CAMPAIGN UPDATE- JANUARY, 2024</u>

As of January 31, 2024 our Comprehensive Campaign is approaching the end of its first year. The Congregational response has been strong and steady. Total pledges = 196 (almost 200!) Total pledged = \$1,928,409 (almost \$2 million!) with \$881,657 received through 1/31/2024. The amount received to date is 46% (almost half!) of the total three year pledged total.

As I mentioned last month, the Comprehensive Campaign Cabinet will be meeting in February to discuss various options to inform the congregation of a continuing vision for the campaign including additional opportunities to participate. Stay tuned!





She is also the author of Case Studies for Equity and Social Justice Education (with Paul Gorski).

Trinity Scholarship Fund

The Trinity Scholarship Fund was established by the estate of Jeanette Johnson, a Trinity member who dreamed of being able to offer college tuition assistance to youth whose achievement and character indicated they possessed the qualities necessary to achieve excellence in higher education.

Trinity awards up to four scholarships each year on the basis of academic status, co-curricular achievement, good citizenship and active involvement at Trinity. The trust also stipulates that scholarship recipients must be baptized at and confirmed by Trinity, and active participants in Trinity youth programs.

Once selected, scholarship winners may renew their scholarships for up to three additional years, providing they maintain a cumulative grade point average of at least 2.75 or a "B-" or, in the absence of a similar grading system, remain in "fine academic standing" as indicated by official record. Scholarship recipients must reapply each year for renewal.

A Successful Day for Housing Insecurity Issues

Jesus says to "love our neighbors as ourselves!" Love of neighbors happened on Jan. 25 at the second annual PIT Stop Winter Event. This event was held at First Presbyterian Church through a collaboration of local faith communities (Trinity, St. Michael's/St. Mary's, Ascension, First Presbyterian), Washington County Community Services, and other service providers.

Thanks to your generosity, Trinity members, including the Trinity Outreach Missions Team, provided \$1,100 worth of gift cards for gas and food. Guests were able to freely choose donated winter apparel and accessories, including shoes, socks and pants. Infant and baby clothes were also available, as well as diapers and personal toiletries.

Representatives from Washington County, Oak Park Heights Police, health insurance companies, public health and legal aid were all available. Social service agencies, such as Valley Outreach, White Bear Food Shelf and The Connect Center also offered assistance.

Breakfast, a hearty hot lunch and snacks were provided for those who desired. Haircuts were available, as well as sewing repair, specifically zipper repair. People who had current housing issues were immediately directed to social services and connections were made.

The PIT (Point in Time) Count occurs yearly all over the United States to help document and count those experiencing homelessness in our communities. The PIT Stop Event was initiated last year to coincide with this formal process.


Our St. Croix Valley community came together in a warm, festive, welcoming and non-judgemental setting.
